STS. JOHN FISHER and THOMAS MORE – Monday, June 22

John Fisher was born in 1469 and Thomas More in 1478, both in England.

John, in due course, became bishop of Rochester. King Henry VIII said that nowhere else in Europe was such a distinguished bishop.

Thomas became a lawyer, married, had a family, and became the first layman to be Lord Chancellor of England.

But they could not agree with the King when he wanted to divorce his wife, Catharine of Aragon, and marry Anne Boleyn, and the upshot of it was the King had both of them beheaded in 1535.

THE BIRTH OF ST. JOHN THE BAPTIST – Wednesday, June 24

He was a cousin of sort of Jesus and was born about six months before him, so his birth is celebrated about six months before Christmas and has been since the late 300's. His death is observed on August 29.

BLESSED NYKYTA BUDKA and VASYL VELYCHOWSKY – Saturday, June 27

Nykyta was born in 1877 and Vasyl in 1903, both in what is now Ukraine

Because of Ukrainian Catholic immigration to Canada, Nykyta was named by the Pope, their bishop in 1912 – he had responsibility for Ukrainian Catholics in all of Canada. In 1927 he returned to Europe and 1945 was arrested in Lviv by the Soviets. Exiled to Siberia, he died a martyr's death in 1949.

Vasyl was also arrested by the Soviets in 1945. After serving ten years in a labour camp, he served the underground Church as priest and then as bishop until arrested again in 1969. In poor health, he was released in 1972 and came to Winnipeg where he died in 1973. His tomb is in St. Joseph's Ukrainian Catholic Church in Winnipeg.
